From our Interim Minister

Dear friends,

'Changing plans'

'I planned to visit you... when I planned this, did I do it lightly?'

(2nd Corinthians 1: 15 & 17)

In the part of the opening chapter of his 2nd letter to the Corinthians, Paul tries to explain to his disappointed (and possibly aggrieved!) readers why his original plans had not worked out. He had planned to visit them once again, but had changed his plans in the light of circumstances. This seems to have irritated the Corinthians and so Paul has to defend this change of plan.

Over these last 15 to 16 months, while we have lived under the restrictions imposed upon us by the pandemic, very many plans have had to be changed. Weddings have been postponed, family gatherings put on hold, holidays cancelled and so on.

Elsewhere in this magazine I say something about how the plans for taking forward the Interim Ministry agenda had to be changed and adapted and delayed due to lockdown.

And the pandemic has also served to magnify, accelerate and exacerbate some of the negative trends that were already becoming clear in the national church, as was made painfully clear at the General Assembly which has just finished (and which is briefly reported upon elsewhere in the Magazine).

The nettle has been at last grasped and urgent and radical action is now being taken, and it won't be easy. It is going to hurt. The problems arise out of the relentless decline of the church which has meant that three very stark realities

have to be faced: we have too little money, we have too few Ministers, and we have too many buildings.

One result of this is that Presbyteries are now going to have to totally abandon their current Presbytery Plans and draw up new, very different and slimmed down plans for the shape of the church in their Presbytery areas.

Yes, plans are changing all around. As Robert Burns so memorably put it, *'The best laid schemes o' mice an' men gang aft a-gley'*.

But perhaps that teaches us something. Perhaps we are too ready to presume that we can come up with plans when God has other ideas! Is there something of our pride involved in this? May we be getting a lesson in humility? And might it be that God is calling us to rely more on him and trust him for the future? As it says in Proverbs *'Trust in the LORD with all your heart and lean not on your own understanding' (Proverbs 3: 5)*.

So let us not lose hope, but learn humility! Let us not despair, but trust more fully. Let us not be disheartened, but be willing to embrace the new future to which we are being led.

We may not find it easy or pleasant, but God will be with us.

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LOOKING AHEAD – Update from the Interim Minister

Interim Ministry Reflection

It has been my usual practice in Interim Ministry placements, to regularly update the congregation on how things were progressing, and you may recall that in the 6 months between my beginning with you and the pandemic restrictions being imposed, I did do that at Sunday Services a couple of times as well as in Magazine articles.

This pattern has inevitably been completely disrupted by lockdown. As we are all too well aware, our emergence from lockdown has taken longer than we would have hoped, and has been gradual, bumpy and faltering. Nonetheless, we do seem set on a course of transitioning from strict restrictions to a return to something more akin to ‘normal’, and – all being well – it seems reasonable to suppose that in addition to Sunday worship, we may be able to return to meetings in person as summer progresses.

This may, therefore, be a good time to resume my congregational updates, and I am planning to do so at Sunday worship every so often as before. But it also seemed an appropriate time to provide you with more general reflection in the Church Magazine as well as in the Weekly Update.

When I began this period of Interim Ministry with you in September 2019, my priority was to listen and discover. Out of that period of meeting several of you, listening to many (especially, but not exclusively, the elders) whether in informal conversations or planned ‘one to one’ meetings I was able to identify some of the issues which would need to be addressed during the period of Interim Ministry. This initial phase of my time with you culminated in the

congregational meeting with the ‘Transitional Support Group’ in February 2020 where Aims and Objectives were discussed.

And then came the pandemic, and the restrictions on ‘in person’ meetings and so forth.

To begin with, there was little expectation that the lockdown would last as long as it has, and so the plan was to return to the Interim Ministry Agenda once things eased sufficiently. Except, they didn’t!

And so, a few months ago we began to return to some of the areas that need addressing, by discussing at the Kirk Session, holding ‘one to one’ meetings via Zoom and phone, having monthly ‘Chat and Share’ meetings online, etc.

The Kirk Session has also agreed to meet online for a number of extra meetings where some of the key issues can be addressed and work taken forward.

As we increasingly focus on those things that need to be addressed there are three particular things I wish to share with you. We have lost a great deal due to this pandemic, and we need to acknowledge this. So very many people have felt the negative impact upon their emotional, mental and social wellbeing. We have lost the comfort, encouragement and strength that comes from connecting with each other in social interactions and in Christian fellowship. We know that many (including some in our congregational circle) have lost health, employment or loved ones, while in the wider society there have been costs to the economy, and to the social fabric of our nation which it will take some time to quantify. In the Church of Scotland, the pandemic has severely exacerbated the difficulties that were already being experienced and addressed with regards resources and

decline, while in our own congregation we will be aware that there has been an inevitable impact on our activities and our income which will take time to assess and address.

But there can be no return to the way things were. That will simply not be possible. It is right that as well as acknowledging all this loss, we allow ourselves to grieve for it. It hurts.

And yet, we have also made progress in some areas over this period, sometimes because of, and sometimes in spite of, the pandemic. Lockdown has afforded us a time to stop, and pause, and reflect and think anew about what kind of future God may be calling us to. Speaking more recently to some of you I am also aware that for many the rawness of some feelings that were around in 2019 have subsided. Many issues of concern have been put into a different perspective. And to give a further specific example, while there were concerns expressed about how effective communication was within the congregation, many now say that over the period of lockdown this has much improved. That is progress! And one of the most recent and clear and welcome indications of progress has been our successful recruitment of our Community Outreach Worker for Govanhill, Amy McElhinney.

As I have looked back at some of the very large number of matters that were raised with me as requiring attention or resolution, it has become clear that in the limited time now left of this Interim Ministry period, there are some things that simply will not and cannot be addressed. So we will need to focus and prioritise to ensure that Queen Park Govanhill is in the best possible position to face the new future and to strongly and confidently move onto the next chapter of our life following this time of Interim Ministry.

Kirk Session Update

The Kirk Session has continued to meet via Zoom over these past several months. At the meeting held on Tuesday 18th May, we addressed the need to move forward on some of the key areas of the Interim Ministry period and process.

As a consequence, it was agreed that we would hold three additional meetings of the Session in June and August.

At the first of these we will be addressing matters arising from the General Assembly regarding the future of the church, issues of congregational 'Governance'.

At the following meeting we will be addressing the development of Mission and Youth strategies for our congregation as well as giving time to further reflecting on the implications of the General Assembly.

Finally, the August meeting will allow us to discuss the emerging and developing shape of our congregation's worship life as restrictions are further lifted, and also plan for the next session in our congregation's life as we seek to re-engage with more 'normal' levels of activity in and from our building. Beyond this, information will be shared, views gathered and conversations engaged in by means of email, online meetings, phone calls and so on, and – all being well – we will be able to begin to plan 'in-person' meetings as the months pass.

HOW OTHER CHRISTIANS HAVE TO LIVE

Chinese pastor Yang Hua, who was attacked by a government official in a Guiyang police station on 23 May, has described the incident and says the police have refused to investigate the matter.

In his account of the attack, Pastor Yang says he was told to go to Zhongshan East Road Police Station on 23 May because he had bought a plane ticket from Guiyang to Qingdao for the next day. According to Yang, police told him he could not travel to Qingdao because 1 July, the 100th anniversary of the Chinese Communist Party, is approaching.

While waiting at the police station, two men claiming to represent the leaders of the Yunyan District Political and Legal Committee entered and immediately began questioning him aggressively. One of them then slapped Yang on his left ear and cheek, while swearing at him, in front of three community officials and one police officer, who took no action to prevent the attack. The attacker continued to punch and swear at Yang, shouting, “This is a Communist world! How dare you want to cross this bottom line?” After Yang fell to the ground, the attacker threatened to beat him to death if he dared to stand up. When Yang attempted to stand, the official pinned him down and continued to strike him before leaving.

Pastor Yang was taken to hospital for medical treatment. At that time, he had a constant ringing in his left ear and severe stomach pain. He later called the police inspector and Mayor’s hotline to report the incident. He also called the police emergency number but was told he needed to make a statement with the Zhongshan East Road Police Station, the same police station where the incident took place.

Chinese authorities have arrested a Vatican-appointed Catholic bishop, seven priests, and an unspecified number of seminarians in Hebei Province. The priests and seminarians were reportedly detained on 20 May for “allegedly violating the country’s repressive new regulations on religious affairs.” 63-year-old Bishop Joseph Zhang Weizhu of Xinxiang Diocese was arrested the following day on 21 May. The Xinxiang Diocese is not recognised by the Chinese authorities, and Bishop Zhang was ordained secretly in 1991 without the approval of the state-sanctioned Bishops’ Conference of the Catholic Church in China (BCCCC) and the Chinese Catholic Patriotic Association (CCPA). The arrests came after the diocese decided to use an abandoned factory building as a seminary. The bishop and priests are being held in solitary confinement in a hotel, where they are undergoing “political sessions.” Students arrested at the same time have been sent back to their families and forbidden to continue studying theology.

A building belonging to the Sudanese Church of Christ (SCOC) in the city of Omdurman, Sudan, was demolished on 27 May, following threats from local residents and authorities. The building was in the process of being rebuilt after being burned down in August 2020. The congregation in the Jabrona area of Omdurman had been renting equipment to continue with church services after their church building was burned down in August 2020, but as rental costs proved expensive, they stated their intention to rebuild the church in May 2021. As the work got underway, a local prosecutor summoned three of the church leaders and ordered them to stop rebuilding the church.

General Assembly 2021

For many years now, General Assemblies of the Church of Scotland have been warned about the challenges we face and the crisis that lies ahead. This year's General Assembly was the one that finally 'bit the bullet' and took action. Let us hope and pray that it is not too little too late.

The crisis we face can be summed up thus: too little money, too few Ministers and too many buildings. And that threefold problem is a direct result to there being too few people in local congregations. This is not a situation unique to the Church of Scotland. All the major denominations seem to be facing similar challenges. But the Kirk's position as the 'national church', our commitment to provide 'the ordinances of religion' to every part of Scotland, and our active care in the nation through Crossreach are unique and are all under threat because of the current crisis.

It would not be possible to overstate the depth of this crisis nor over-emphasise the urgency of the Church's response. But it won't be easy, and it is local congregations that will feel the impact, as the national agencies of the church and personnel working nationally have already been pruned back to the very bare minimum, while the reduction in the number of Presbyteries is work in progress.

The number of full time Ministers that can be provided in the future will be cut by around 30%

throughout Scotland and (for a variety of demographic reasons) that will hit Glasgow Presbytery even more severely with a cut in the number of full time Ministers of almost 40%. Presbyteries have to produce new Presbytery Plans for the congregations in their bounds very quickly and until they do congregations that fall vacant will not be able to call a new Minister. This will, of course, have an impact on all congregations, including ours.

But, it is not all gloom and doom! The intention remains to 'plant' new worshipping communities throughout Scotland, to facilitate area team ministries with groupings of congregations, and to encourage 'Pioneer' ministries, etc. And while the Assembly was certainly in serious, and sometimes sombre, mood, there was also much vision and cause for hope.

The Assembly continues to receive and rejoice in the reports of the excellent caring work of Crossreach, and speaks out for justice and Christian values to the nation. But there is no denying the fact that we are in difficult times, and facing radical change.


