From our Interim Minister

Dear friends,

*‘Mary stood outside the tomb,
crying’ (John 20: 11)*

At this point in the Christian Year – as we travel with Jesus towards Jerusalem and all it holds – we can feel the growing tension and sense the encroaching darkness. Even the ‘Hosannas’ of Palm Sunday can seem somewhat subdued, as we discern the shadow of the Cross falling over the superficially joyful scenes of Jesus’ entry into the city. The darkness deepens as our Lord shares his Last Supper with his disciples, as he prays in anguish, is betrayed and arrested, deserted and denied, tried and condemned, and then sentenced and crucified.

After all of that, it is no wonder that we greet the dawning of Easter Day with joy and delight as we sing our Alleluias and proclaim that ‘The Lord is Risen’!

Too easily we can forget that on the first Easter Sunday, dawn was not greeted with Alleluias. The early morning procession to the tomb was not that of a gathering of worshippers to sing praises to the ‘Risen, Conquering Son’, but was in fact a procession of mourners, gathering to pay their last respects.

The sight of the Empty Tomb was not initially cause for celebration, but for still more grief, mingled

with terror and confusion.

No wonder Mary wept outside the tomb.

She did not realise how everything had already changed. She did not appreciate that her life would never be the same again. She could not know that death had been defeated and victory had been declared. The greatest and most transformative event in all of history had occurred, but she knew it not!

Sometimes, even although we affirm faith in a God who is working out his plans, fulfilling his purposes, and acting on his promises, we can remain in confusion and doubt, unaware of what he is doing or has done, but which we do not yet discern.

Let us keep faith and be joyful, knowing that God is with us, God is at work, God is victorious, and God’s purposes will finally prevail.

Hallelujah!

Interim Minister Report

*'So Long, Farewell,
Auf Wiedersehen, Adieu'*

Well, it is certainly farewell from me to you as your Interim Minister as I head off to the green pastures of retirement...

Interim Moderator

...however, I will be continuing as your Interim Moderator which means I will be moderating Kirk Session meetings and will be continuing to have a light 'touch on the tiller' as we proceed through the forthcoming Presbytery Plan procedure. And I will – as Interim Moderator – have certain other 'behind the scenes' responsibilities to carry out. However, (aside from one planned Sunday) I will not have any responsibility for conduct of Sunday worship or pastoral care etc.

Locum

The Kirk Session have approved the appointment of a locum, and the person who has agreed to be Locum for the first three months of the vacancy beginning 1st May is **Rev Morris Dutch** who is well known to the congregation and has been locum here before. We are delighted that from May to July, Morris is coming to us and look forward to welcoming him.

Transitional Support Group (TSG)

A 'TSG' is set up for every Interim Ministry placement and ours met with us in February of 2020 to help us agree our aims and objectives for the period of Interim Ministry. Of course, within a very few weeks thereafter,

we were in lockdown and could not take things forward as we had hoped or intended. Nonetheless, when the TSG returned to meet with us a week or two back to review the process and consider what progress had been made, they were very impressed by the sense that the congregation were very positive and hopeful.

A full copy of the final report will be available for anyone who wishes to have a copy. Among the conclusions are these:

- a huge amount has been achieved in a relatively short space of time in extremely challenging situations that could not have been foreseen at the beginning of the interim ministry period
- there has been a distinct shift to dwell more in the present than in the past
- The TSG certainly found the congregation to be in good heart.

Presbytery Plan

As I have indicated, one of the reasons I have agreed to stay on as Interim Moderator is in order that I can help you through the Presbytery Planning Process until it is completed and its implications for this congregation become clear.

At the time of writing this, things are at quite an uncertain stage and that uncertainty is causing a good deal of anxiety in many congregations, as you might expect. However, at this time everything remains exploratory and provisional, and while conversations between congregations are ongoing,

no outcomes have yet been reached and so there is little to report to you at this moment.

Congregational Governance

For what seems like the longest of times(!) the Kirk Session have been addressing issues of how we run our congregation and how the Kirk Session operates etc. This has resulted in a reshaping of the areas of work and who is responsible for these, and following the April Kirk Session meeting we will be able to report (in the next Magazine) the various areas of work and who the contact people are for these.

However, this review of Governance has also led to two new key appointments:

Malcolm Leitch has been appointed by the Kirk Session to the position of **Depute Session Clerk** and will work alongside Jo in assisting in the clerking of Session meetings and administrative matters etc.

Lynn Flower has been appointed by the Kirk Session as **Church Manager** to coordinate and facilitate the use, development, and care of our building and its place the mission of the congregation. In truth, this is largely simply a recognition of the work that Lynn has already been undertaking.

We welcome Lynn and Malcolm to these posts and do please pray for them. Watch out in next month's magazine for further updates.

Who's Who?

There are a large number of groups we welcome to our buildings every week and who appreciate our beautiful facilities.

Part of our outreach to the parish is ensuring that all groups and their members feel welcomed and a valued part of our community here. Building relationships is crucial to our mission and witness as a congregation and so a little information about each of the groups is provided below.

Mondays

Alcoholics Anonymous – The Park group meet in the Welcome Hall every Monday evening. The group is very busy and one of the largest in the southside.

Hard of Hearing Club meet alternate Monday afternoons and are part of John Ross Memorial Church.

Kettlebells Robert, who runs the Kettlebells Fitness Club on Mondays and Wednesdays stays in Queen's Drive and as well as running his own club has been a huge asset to the Church Holiday Club offering coaching to the children.

Tuesdays

Colourstrings Suzanne, who runs the Colourstrings class on Tuesdays in the Gateway Hall, introduces pre school children to the world of music in a fun, engaging and structured way, exploring music through songs, games, rhymes and movement using props, percussion, puppets and experiencing live musical instruments.

Krav Maga Jesse, who runs Krav Maga is also local and passes the church every day keeping a watchful eye on our security. Krav Maga is a reality based Self Defence class which is non competitive.

Game of Stones aims to conduct high quality applied research that enables health professionals to make a difference to the lives of men in Govanhill through a weight loss programme. Our workers are Claire and Kathryn and they use the lounge on Tuesdays and Thursdays.

Wednesdays

Elevate Fitness Ewen, who runs Elevate Fitness is also local and he uses our premises on Wednesday and Friday mornings and evenings for his boot camp fitness classes. He has also been a great asset to the holiday club providing coaching sessions for children. He can also regularly be seen in Queen's Park running his "boot camps."

Unity Sisters. Unity Sisters is a self-organised support group for asylum-seeking women and refugees. They are a group of women who have all experienced the process of going through the immigration system, and they aim to support women who've shared those same experiences. They spend three sessions a month in the Welcome Hall and the fourth in the Gateway hall where they enjoy lunch provided by the Milk Café, crochet, knit and chat !

Thursdays

Old Folks Deaf Club meet in the Welcome Hall on Thursdays during the day. A large group who are gathered from all over the city, they enjoy some games, have lunch and just socialise with each other. Some, but not all are members of John Ross Memorial Church.

Govanhill Voices who are a local singing group were founded in 2012. They meet

in our Gateway Hall at 7.15 on Thursdays for about 2 hours with a break in the middle for tea, biscuits and catching up. Open to everyone!

Fridays

Quoir meet on Friday evenings and are a fully-inclusive choir for all members of the community. They meet in the Welcome Hall at 7.30p.m.

Victoria Atkinson is a soprano teacher who has pupils in the Welcome Hall on Fridays during the day.

Janos runs Ando Glaso, a Roma dancing and music group who meet on Fridays in the Lilac Room and sometimes on Saturdays too.

As well as our regular weekly bookings we have a large number of more occasional users.

The Royal Conservatoire of Scotland, formerly the Royal Scottish Academy of Music and Drama is a conservatoire of dance, drama, music, production, and film and they often use our premises as additional rehearsal space. On the back of this, Gary their tutor, often uses our premises for rehearsals for his own company **21 Common**.

Company of Wolves is a laboratory theatre company based in Glasgow. Formed by Pollokshields couple, Ewan Downie and Anna Porubcansky, they often use our premises for rehearsal either individually or together.

Smith and Smith Theatre Katie and Emma form this young theatre company and can often be found rehearsing in the Lilac Room.

Poppins Nursery as well as providing the security of emergency accommodation to our neighbouring nursery we also provide a venue for special events, Christmas and summer concerts and events for parents.

Strathbungo Society use our premises for their fundraising events and for their AGM.

Niddrie Road Redevelopment The tenement retrofit concerning eight single bed flats in one traditional tenement in Niddrie Road, has attracted lots of publicity in the press and the public meetings about this project have been in our Welcome Hall and sanctuary.

Old Glasgow Club hosts regular talks and occasional events for people interested in Glasgow, its environs, its history and its people. They have had the occasional open meeting in our Welcome Hall and their committee have been using the Welcome Hall for their meetings in recent months.

Govanhill Living Rent Group The Govanhill branch was established in June 2020 in the midst of the COVID-19 pandemic to organise to improve the rights of tenants in both the private and social sector. Our link for this group is Cameron Beattie. They meet in our Lilac Room once or twice a month.

Hampden Bowling Club Unfortunately Hampden Bowling Club, at Kingsley Avenue, have lost the use of their club house due to damage so have been using the Welcome Hall and /or the Lilac Room for their planning meetings as they seek the best way forward for the club.

Occasion Theatre for young learning, disabled adults are meeting in our church for rehearsals.

There also continues to be many opportunities for outreach as requests for 'one off lets' come in daily.

WAY IN....Jeremiah 1-11

Jeremiah lived and worked in one of the most turbulent periods in Jewish history. His prophesies cover the reigns of the last 5 kings of Judah down to the fall of Jerusalem. The northern kingdom of Israel had already

fallen as a result of turning away from God but, in the South, Judah had failed to learn the lessons. They worshipped local gods and oppression, injustice and a refusal to live by God’s law were everywhere. The thrust of Jeremiah’s message is that unless there is a return to God disaster will fall at the hands of an invader.

Jeremiah’s message was not a popular one. Our world is very different but we still asset our independence and reject God. God, as he did through Jeremiah, still calls in grace for people to come back.


